How to help your child learn by exploring:

- Walk around your neighborhood or park. Talk about things you see. Look for colors and shapes. Count flowers and trees. Help your child use all senses: "What do you hear? What do you smell?"
- Walk around your living space. Look for colors & shapes. Play singing games. Play "pretend." Build with blocks, pillows, and boxes.
- Visit your local library. They have many free programs and activities for children. Some libraries offer "Kindergarten Countdown!" to help children learn and practice skills for kindergarten. The program runs from February to April each year.
- Go to a grocery store or farmer's market. Give your child a simple list of things to find. Name fruits and vegetables. Say the beginning letters and sounds of their name. Have your child help prepare food you buy.
- Visit the school where your child will go or any local school when school is not in session. Walk around to see where things are. Play on the playground.

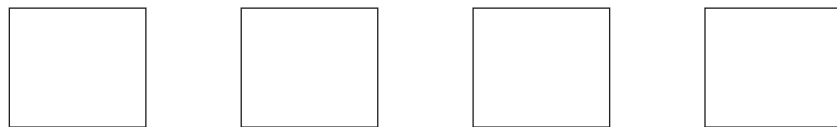
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I am exploring!

- I am an outdoor explorer learning about people, places and events where I live.
- I am an indoor explorer, too. I sing, dance, play games, pretend, and build things.
- I go to the library for story time and to find books I like to read.
- I go to the grocery store or farmer's market. I choose my favorite fruit and vegetable and try new ones.
- I visit the school where I will go to kindergarten to check it out.

How to help your child learn these skills:

- Play games to practice throwing, catching and kicking a ball. Use balls of different sizes. Bean bags or foam balls are easier to catch when learning.
- Draw shapes for your child to cut. Have your child cut pictures out of magazines and paste on paper to create artwork.
- Have your child sit and listen while you read a story. If they can't sit and listen for 10 minutes, start with a shorter length of time and work on increasing it.
- Make opportunities for your child to play with others their age. Go to a park or playground. Check out activities at your community center or at a First 5 Center (www.first5coco.org).
- Help your child practice self-help skills like getting dressed, doing buttons and zippers, opening containers and bags that they might use for lunch, and using the bathroom independently.

How to help your child learn these skills:

- Describe colors and shapes of objects when you talk with your child. Ask your child to name colors and shapes of objects.
- Help your child practice counting from 1 to 10.
- Help your child learn to count objects by asking them "How many...?" Then help them to count the objects to answer your question.
- Give your child crayons, markers, pencils, and paper to draw pictures. Sit with them, and draw, too. Ask them to tell you about their drawing. Ask them questions about your drawing.
- Write your child's name, and post it where they will see it inside your living space (on doors, refrigerator, bathroom mirror).
- Write their name and help them trace it.
- Read with your child. Have them hold the book and turn pages. Ask them 1 or 2 questions about the story. Ask them to tell you 1 or 2 things that happened in the story.
- Read with your child. Point out letters and numbers as you read. Ask them to name letters and numbers.
- Tell them the sound that a letter makes. Ask them to say the sound that a letter makes.
- Tell your child 1 or 2 things that happened or that you did during the day. Then ask your child to tell you 1 or 2 things that happened or that they did during the day.
